Mammalogist to speak at banquet

David M. Armstrong, a retired University of Colorado professor, will enlighten us with the "Mammals of Jefferson County: Past, Present, and Prospects" at the Evergreen Audubon Annual Banquet on Jan. 17.

Dave will discuss how the mammals of Jefferson County are a mix of native and introduced species, that is, species that have been here "forever" and those that have arrived more recently.

Many of our mammals have been here since the recession of glaciation and several others since Euro-American settlement beginning in the 19th century. He'll talk about our dynamic fauna and what Evergreen

can expect to see in the future, particularly as species from the Southwest are able to expand "upslope."

These "mammalian weeds", as Dave calls them, will continue to expand because of climatic warming and habitat changes due to human impacts, such as fragmentation of mammal environments.

In addition to being a retired professor of ecology, evolutionary biology and environmental studies at the University of Colorado at Boulder, Dave is the former director of the University of Colorado Museum.

The Bear Creek Birding Challenge

January is a somewhat slow time for birding in the mountains. To perk up your interest in birding throughout the year and to explore the wide range of habitats found throughout the Bear Creek Watershed, I am offering the "2014 Bear Creek Watershed Birding Challenge."

From Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 2014, get out and record all the bird species you find in the watershed. A map of the watershed can be found on our website on the bird monitoring page. There also is a bird checklist for the watershed.

We will all trust each other on individually and correctly identifying species and for only recording species observed within the watershed boundaries.

I will collect checklists at the end of 2014 and announce the winner at our Annual Banquet in 2015. To stimulate interest in younger birders, I suggest we award high counts in youth (less than 18 years old) and adult (19-plus) categories. Good birdin'!

He is the author and co-author of several books, including "Rocky Mountain Mammals, Third Edition," "Distribution of Mammals in Colorado" and "Mammals of the Northern Great Plains." His book, "Mammals of Colorado, Second Edition," is the definitive book on the subject.

When asked for pictures associated with his talk, he said, "I'm among the world's least competent photographers, and the interesting mammals don't photograph very well anyway-sneaking around in the dark as they tend to do-so how about highlighting Audubon prints of Jeffco natives?"

BIRD BUSINESS MARILYN RHODES, ASGD MASTER BIRDER

The two most unusual local sightings in November came from Warren Roske on the 25th. That day he saw a **Northern Shrike** in a tree off the boardwalk by the Evergreen Audubon Monthly Bird Checklist at Evergreen Lake.

This shrike has only been reported at the lake in three previous years, 2007, 2009 and 2010. He had another rare sighting earlier in the month on Nov. 1, a **Black-crowned Night-Heron**.

The heron was on the little island across the road from the Lakepoint Center and was the very first reported for Evergreen Lake.

For those of you who don't know, Warren and Loie Evans patrol Evergreen Lake daily in May and September, during peak migration.

Warren hits the lake three to four times a week the rest of the year, except in winter. When temperatures drop, he only goes a couple of times a week since there is so little open water.

Warren and Loie post all of their sightings to the Evergreen Audubon Monthly Bird Checklist, which the club erected on the boardwalk many years ago.

Warren pulls the checklist at the end of each month and tabulates the results. His records go back about 10 years now.

Although others post to the board occasionally, Warren and Loie have been the primary reporters and Warren is the keeper of the data.

A little trivia: Warren and Bill Brockner had more in common than you might know. They not only shared a love of birding Evergreen Lake, they also shared the same birthdate, July 22.

Yard Birds Snow and below-freezing temps generate lots of activity

On Dec. 6, Sherman Wing had an **Oregon Junco** at his feeder.

He reported again from his Indian Hills home on Dec. 8, "Today at Indian Hills: Junco-20+, Red-winged Blackbird-30+, starling-a dozen, Steller's Jay, crow, magpie, Mountain Chickadee, Black-capped Chickadee, Pygmy Nuthatch, White-breasted Nuthatch, flicker, Hairy Woodpecker, Downy Woodpecker, House Finch, Cassin's Finch." JoAnn and Bill Hackos responded that they had similar activity at their Soda Creek home:

"This weekend we have had a variety of juncos at our feeders: **White-winged** is the predominant, **Grayheaded** is second, **Pinksided** (three), **Oregon** (one), **Cassiar** (one—looks like an Oregon but has an almost black back).

"Other than the juncos, we're much like Sherman, Mountain Chickadee, White-breasted Nuthatch, Pygmy Nuthatch (lots), House Finch, Hairy Woodpecker, Downy Woodpecker, Steller's Jay, Blackbilled Magpie, Northern Flicker."

The same day, Karel Buckley chimed in, "A huge flock of **Pine Siskins** just arrived here at my feeders—all the previously mentioned birds were here earlier."

Next, Mark Meremonte said he'd had all the mentioned birds except **Redwinged Blackbirds**, starlings and **Pine Siskins.** "The cold has especially brought the juncos into the feeders," he said.

That day, Sherman had a **Cassin's Finch**, which is not common here.

Around Dec. 10, Shirley Casey had six to eight **American Goldfinches** hanging around at the feeders most days.

Birch Hill Park

Sherman Wing and his team surveyed Birch Hill Park on Nov. 9, "Today was a fairly typical November in the foothills, with only wintering residents seen. We saw all three nuthatches, Mountain Chickadees, Dark-eyed Juncos, Townsend's Solitaires, Red-tailed Hawks . . . crows, magpies and ravens.
