With Earth Day, Bear Creek Lake Earth Day, Dawn Chorus and International Migratory Bird Day behind us for the year, we are heading into the thick of the breeding season.

Flycatchers, vireos, thrushes and warblers will be returning any day. Sherman Wing and his team are already recording great birds at the Birch Hill Denver Mountain Park site.

Mike Foster, an Evergreen Audubon member, is offering a series of classes for beginning birders, which will hopefully begin the training of a cadre of potential volunteers. Mike has written about a variety of historical, mountaineering and natural history topics.

Let's share some tech talk



Red-winged Blackbirds fill the wetlands at Evergreen Lake in the spring. However, Alistair Montgomery captured this beauty at Crown Hill Park on May 5. I'm kind of a techie and a gadget person, so I'd like to start a conversation about tools that might be helpful while in the field birding.

I just upgraded my smart phone to one with an extra-long battery life so I can use it all day with the GPS and wireless functions, which are big battery drains. I used it in Cape May with two nominally priced apps, Birdseye (with Bird-Log) and iBird Pro.

iBird Pro is an interactive field guide. It has photos, facts, descriptions, calls and ranges of all North American bird species.

Birdseye is useful for locating species of birds in specific areas based on recent sightings and BirdLog is used to record sightings. It utilizes GPS and interfaces with eBird.

I'm curious as to what others are using. I also employ an app called birdJam on my iPad on field trips

to show participants target birds and play their song/call.

Please email me at cloverlane@aol.com about the tools you use and I'll share your reviews. We'll get this birding stuff down to a science.

BIRD BUSINESS MARILYN RHODES

I've been traveling a lot since I submitted the last column, so I'm catching up on sightings as I write. Bill and JoAnn Hackos got to see the **White-faced Ibis** at Evergreen Lake April 16. I hope many of you got to enjoy them, too.

If you didn't and you'd like to be alerted to local sightings as soon as possible, subscribe to the Evergreenbirders email list found on the website under Local Sightings.

A lot of breeding activity was reported over the last month. Karel Buckley and Else Van Erp walked Lair o' the Bear April 17. Highlights were **Audubon's Yellow-rumped Warblers**, a pair of **American Dippers** nesting under the eastern bridge, many blooming wildflowers and at least eight species of butterflies, all gorgeous. "Time to carry your new Butterfly Guide Book with you on birding trips," according to Karel

On April 16, Debbie Marshall watched a pair of **House Finches** start building a nest in a basket nailed on a beam under their eaves. The Marshalls, who live near the top of Independence Mountain, had Cordilleran Flycatchers in that basket previously, so they hope they find somewhere nearby to nest this year. The finches fledged on May 21.

On April 22, Julie Westland reported an FOS (first of season) **Broad-tailed Hummingbird** in Beaver Brook Canyon.

The next day, April 23, Sherman Wing sighted a possible breeding **Great Blue Heron** carrying a stick in his bill near O'Fallon Park. On April 24, Sherman had a juvenile first-year **Cooper's Hawk.** It was calling and seen flying with an adult Cooper's in the riparian area of Matthews/Winters Park.

Mary Lumm was excited to see a pair of **Eurasian-collared Doves** at her home birdbath, near Evergreen Lake, April 24 and 25.

Sherman and his crew were at Birch Hill, their Bear Creek Atlas site, again on April 28. Although the morning was chilly, they found a female **Three-toed Woodpecker** foraging on an old large

Local birders travel far and wide

Bill and JoAnn Hackos were in Gunnison April 14 observing **Gunnison Sage Grouse** on their lek. They got distant views of 11 grouse with two males displaying all their finery.

On April 28, JoAnn and Bill had a great trip to southern California. They started in the mountains in Julian, east of San Diego at 4,000 feet, drove to Anza Borrega (very hot, over 100 degrees), then birded in the San Diego harbor area.

They saw 110 species including two life birds—**Lawrence's Gold-finch** and a migrating **Hermit Warbler** during a warbler fallout.

Bill and JoAnn are currently revisiting Lewis and Clark's journey to the Pacific Northwest. You can follow their travels on their blog at www. pygmynuthatches.com.

Sherman Wing was in western Colorado the week of April 16 enjoying the blossoming of spring. In the marshes, **Red-winged Blackbirds** and **Song Sparrows** were singing away, along with three **Yellow-headed Blackbirds**.

In the pond, he saw a Western Grebe and Pied-billed Grebes, and overhead a flock of 29 White Pelicans. Gazing along the river's ri-

parian area, he saw a flock of **White-crowned Sparrows** foraging.

Marilyn Rhodes scored a new life bird in southeastern Colorado on April 21 when she saw **Lesser Prairie Chickens** on the lek in Granada, near Lamar, and also got to see **Piping Plovers** at John Martin Reservoir and **Snowy Plovers** at Lake Cheraw, north of Lamar.

She checked a couple of items off her Bucket List in May, finally making it to Cape May, N.J., to see the horseshoe crab spectacle and bagging her life **Red Knot**. Hundreds of thousands of migrating shorebirds stop in Cape May to feed on the crab eggs at low tide.

She also birded Bombay Hook National Wildlife Refuge in Delaware and climbed to the top of Hawk Mountain in Kempton, Pa., where the Brockners spent their honeymoon.

Marilyn also spent a night owling near the Pawnee Grasslands. She saw nesting **Swainson's Hawks**, a pair of nesting **Great Horned Owls**, a **Burrowing Owl** and a **Barn Owl** nest under a bridge near Briggsdale. Pictures of the nest with four owlets and a couple of eggs surrounded by dead mice are posted in the Gallery.

snag along the trail . . . that really got their juices flowing and warmed things up.

As the morning progressed, they heard an **Ovenbird's** song several times, but never saw it.

In the aspen riparian area they heard the call of the Williamson's Sapsucker several times and the songs of several Ruby-crowned Kinglets. Brown Creepers were close by and they all heard their song. An Osprey made an unexpected fly-over spotted by Larry White.

Brad Andres had a **Loggerhead Shrike** the morning of April 29 in Elk Meadow.

The morning of April 28, John Sears had a welcome visitor to his feeder in Conifer. An FOS male **Red Crossbill** showed up for some breakfast. The next day, Sherman had **Red Crossbills** at his feeder in Indian Hills.

JoAnn Hackos welcomed the first Broad-tailed **Humming-bird** to her home feeders in Soda Creek on April 30.

On March 30, Susan Harper observed a male **Red Cross-bill** feeding a juvenile near her home south of Evergreen Lake. Susan heard a **Western Wood-Pewee** calling from the hill above Evergreen Golf Course on April 13, and the first **Chipping Sparrow** returned to her yard on April 14.

Susan and her mom had a delightful morning at the lake April 30, catching quick glimpses of a **Common Yellowthroat** right off the boardwalk.

Then they were serenaded by a nearby **Song Sparrow** while watching a few **Green-winged Teal**, **American Widgeon** and a flotilla of **Northern Shovelers** in the distance. A **Spotted Sandpiper** claimed a nearby sandbar.

Karel Buckley was on her way home the evening of May 2 when she was thrilled to see her first "live" gray fox. Last winter, she found a dead one on the golf course, but that didn't count . . .

Half an hour later, she flashed her headlights on a mountain lion with a black furry animal in its mouth. It turned immediately and ran away from her, and she couldn't find it again. This was her sixth lion sighting in 24 years!

Good news! Karel's treatments are coming to an end and things are looking good, very hopeful, although it has been a very long winter for her. We know she will be recovering soon and be back out in the field with us in a few weeks.

May Day morning marked the arrival of an FOS **Black-headed Grosbeak** at the Hackos backyard in Soda Creek.

Sherman and company celebrated Cinco de Mayo in Birch Hill Park. They had 5 singing Virginia's Warblers, 8 Yellowrumped Warblers, a pair of Williamson's Sapsuckers and their first Black-headed Grosbeak of the season. Sherman also saw a Yellow Warbler singing in the riparian area at Matthews/Winters Park the afternoon of May 9.

Mike Quaintance gave Sylvia Brockner a photo of a **Lewis's Woodpecker** he took near his home in the Bailey area in early May.

Sylvia has had several reports of nesting **Evening Grosbeaks** in the area, although in fairly small numbers compared

to past years. Sylvia suspects she has three pairs nesting at her house up Little Cub Creek Road, as they have for several years.

On May 14, Scott Mosiman posted in Local Sightings that he had seen a bird three weeks before, on his porch, that he didn't recognize. It was scratching around in the corner of his patio and he first thought it was a junco, but it was a bit bigger and the wrong color.

It was mostly a light buff color, with a reddish-brown cap, and after a while, Scott identified it as a **Canyon Towhee**. It would be unusual to see a Canyon Towhee in Evergreen, so any photos would be great. The Green-tailed Towhee is much more common.

The **Greater Roadrunner** continues to be seen around Dinosaur Ridge.

Pygmy Nuthatches have set up shop in my nest-cam nest box again this year. The female is sitting on eggs as I type.


